The Library's extensive collection includes the Book of Kells which was on display for the group to see during their time in Dublin.

Another interesting aspect of the trip was seeing Ireland's national symbol, a Gaelic harp, depicted on windows and money. One of the few remaining medieval harps can also be found at Trinity College.

Moving on from Dublin, the tour traveled to Galway and Killarney.


Another highlight on the tour was stopping at Blarney Castle and kissing the Blarney Stone.

The final stop was Killkenny where the group got a chance to visit a marketplace and explore the city before the tour ended on June 13.
