

Dragons sweep Merino in 2

Holyoke Dragon baseball team kept its unblemished season alive Saturday, March 31 with two quick and convincing wins over the Merino Rams, 16-0 and 22-1. Both games ended by run rule which made for a quick day at the diamond.

The 16-0 shutout was Holyoke's third of the season. The Dragons have scored 122 runs this season while holding their opponents to just 14.

The two victories improved Holyoke's record to 8-0 as they prepared for a busy week of baseball this week and head into the tougher portion of their schedule.

The team traveled to Akron Monday, April 2 instead of Tuesday, April 3. In anticipation of bad weather Tuesday, coaches agreed to get the games played and out of the way Monday.

"I was very happy with our performance on Saturday," coach Kyle Bules said. "The pitchers did an excellent job of throwing strikes and establishing their fastball, only giving up one walk in 35 plate appearances. Merino put the ball in play and we did a great job defensively. We are doing a better job of running the bases but still have a ways to go."
