Unrein was on hand for the AFC championship game in Denver Jan. 19 when the team secured a trip to the Super Bowl.

“In 25 years, that was as loud as I’ve ever heard the crowd,” Unrein said.

Also in attendance for the AFC championship game, Steve Young said the energy in the stands was unlike any other game he has been to. He estimated that he sat only three to four minutes throughout the night.

One Holyoke High School alum was lucky enough to snag a highly coveted ticket for the big game. Gentry Lock, a 2001 HHS grad, now lives in New York City and will be rooting for her home-state team firsthand.

While she said she is nervous about the expected winter conditions, she won’t let the cold keep her from the game.

“I can deal with 30- to 40-degree weather,” Lock said. “But if the weather doesn’t warm up soon, I’ll be watching the game in my snow pants, snow boots and parka.”
