

2013-14 school year brings in 9 new teachers

Nine new teachers gathered Tuesday, Aug. 6 for their first day in the Holyoke School District. The bunch is eager to get the school year rolling.

Four new teachers have been hired at the elementary school including Tressa Amann, kindergarten; Cynthia Bahler, kindergarten; Kortney Firme, second grade; and Nancy Miles, special education.

Five positions have been filled at Holyoke JR/SR High including Havilah Andersen, life science; Clay Christensen, agriculture education; Abby Einspahr, math; Chuck Hurst, business; and Josh Rahe, language arts.

Students will fill the schools Thursday, Aug. 15 for the first day of the 2013-14 year.

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Tressa Amann

A new face to the Holyoke community, Tressa Amann has been hired as one of the new kindergarten teachers at Holyoke Elementary School. She will be starting her first year of teaching.

Amann graduated with honors in June with a Bachelor of Arts degree in elementary education from Colorado Christian University after only three years of schooling. She was named the Outstanding Student of the Year for 2012-13 by her professors and staff members at CCU.

Although this is Amann's first time as the head of a classroom, she is no stranger to working with kids. She has 14 years of experience working in preschools in Colorado.

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Havilah Andersen

Bringing excitement for learning and teaching to the JR/SR High is Havilah Andersen, the new life science teacher.

Her excitement for the position is evident. “This job is all the things I love,” she said, noting she wants to get the kids interested and engaged in science by presenting the material in a way they can relate to.

Everyone at the school is great so far, Andersen said, and she looks forward to getting to know the students.

Working with kids has always been a positive experience for Andersen, who has spent extensive time as a youth Sunday school teacher with the Mormon church in Sterling. She worked as a personal trainer for the last four years at Outback Fitness in Haxtun but looks forward to pursuing a career in education.

Bahler attended Kearney High School where she graduated in 1989. She then moved on to the University of Nebraska at Kearney and the University of Wyoming 1989-1994.

Earning a degree in elementary education and special education was not Bahler's original plan. She started school with the intent of getting a degree in photography until she realized all the things she enjoyed doing centered around kids.

Bahler is looking forward to the hugs and humor of her students and their “a-ha” moments when they realize they can write their names or tie their shoes. She wants to be a teacher that leads them down a path with an enthusiasm for learning.

Clay Christensen is getting settled in at Holyoke JR/SR High as the new agriculture education instructor and FFA advisor.

Earning his FFA American degree, Christensen was active in FFA throughout high school in Wright, Wyo., where he graduated in 2008.

He recently earned a Bachelor of Science with two majors, agriculture education and agriculture business, from the University of Wyoming in May 2013. There he competed on the livestock judging team in 2011-12 and was the president of the ag education organization Alpha Tau

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Alpha.

The small school setting of Holyoke appealed to Christensen for his first teaching job. So far he's liked it in Holyoke and likes how he'll be able to walk down the street and know everybody.

One of his goals is to have his students career ready by preparing them with resumes, cover letters and interviews.

As far as FFA goes, he wants to keep last year's forward momentum going and keep getting the program organized. He said he wants to bring the ag program back to a community program with things like service projects that will get the students interacting with the community.

Abby Einspahr

A 2002 HHS graduate, Abby Einspahr is again walking the halls of the JR/SR High, this time as a math teacher for grades 7-9.

While Einspahr was back in northeast Colorado teaching junior high history in Yuma last year, she's looking forward to teaching math this year and being closer to family. Her parents Allen and Amy Einspahr, brother Adam Einspahr and sister Amber Sprague and their families all live in Holyoke.

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She taught in California for three years at Grace Lutheran School in Modesto and another three years at Calvary Lutheran School in San Lorenzo. She gained experience in a wide range of middle school subjects including math, language arts, literature, spelling, art, religion, P.E., keyboarding and health.
